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1. Note from the Managing Trustee

This year has undoubtedly been a most disruptive, dispiriting and even damaging one for children and for those who work with and for them. As in the rest of India, children in Karnataka were probably some of the worst sufferers, if not by being actually attacked by the Covid-19 virus, due to the deleterious effects of the lockdowns - the loss of employment and income in the family, resulting in children's poorer health and nutrition; disruptions due to brutal migrations; anganwadi and school closures that affected not only their learning but also their nutritional supplements, peer interactions and play opportunities – leading to all types of problems from being pulled into child labour or child marriage to mental anguish due to restrictions on their normal activities and also due to the uncertainties and the chaos in their daily lives.

CRT, along with countless other child rights organisations, was first stunned by the first lockdown but quickly energised itself to provide relief and awareness directly to vulnerable families. It also produced a lot of awareness materials for caregivers and other duty bearers of children.

I am proud of our team that so quickly and eagerly adapted to the changed circumstances and reinvented itself. At the same time, it could not totally drop its usual activities, working from home, reaching out to children, child-related institutions and NGOs, while adhering to Covid-19 appropriate behaviour norms.

We managed to keep contact with our target groups and NGOs with innovative use of online platforms in each of our projects – even if the individual children did not have access to such facilities, they were constituted into groups with the support of the NGO concerned, and discussions and training were continued.

One major breakthrough was E-Manthana [E-discussions] a weekly zoom event wherein different child-related topics were discussed with a lead speaker or panel, followed by interactive sessions with the audience. Several of these were led by experts but some also featured some unusual or innovative programme or individual, often in a remote area -these were scintillating pointers to hidden talents and dedication. The sessions were sometimes attended by huge numbers, even upto 100. Now they are also available on FB and YouTube, and so the reach may be much wider.

With the continued prospect of Covid -19 mutations that later may become endemic, we will have to keep adapting and innovating. This is a challenge that CRT will face with continued determination and teamwork.

2. Vision, Mission and Aim

Child Rights Trust [CRT] is a non-profit organization involved in spreading child rights perspectives among all stakeholders. Initiated in August 2002, CRT has a goal to reach out to individuals and groups who are at the grassroots level working directly with vulnerable children as well as administrators and policy makers at the highest level. Through research, training, advocacy and lobbying activities, CRT is empowering NGOs to be effective in their service provision from child rights perspective and also in preparing vulnerable groups in both urban and rural areas to access the services due to them from the Govt. In its pursuit to uphold every right to every child, CRT is working with people's representatives and Governments from grassroots to national level using advocacy and lobbying techniques. We have been recognised with the Karnataka State Child Welfare Award in 2008.

4. Impact So far

- Developed the concept of Child Rights Grama Sabha (CRGS) in 2006 which is now part of the RDPR system. Every year on an average one lakh fifty thousand children and in the last 15 years around 22 lakh children have taken part in the CRGS held at Grama Panchayats of Karnataka and have experienced democratic processes at the grassroots level.
- Since 2008 in the district level Child Rights Parliaments, every year about 1,500 children, on an average, are taking part, and so far, more than 20,000 children have taken part in the process.
- Around 500 child representatives have interacted with the legislators, ministers and Chief Ministers in the State level Child Rights Parliament held since 2008 and have raised child rights centric issues voicing the concerns from the grassroots experiences. The process has reached several policy and implementation issues to the highest level of the decision making and have resulted in some programs and projects.
- Facilitated with more than 100 legislators in Karnataka to form Karnataka Legislators Forum for Child Rights since 2008 and reached out to more than 1000 child centric issues to be raised on the floor of the Legislative Council and Assembly.
- Regular interactions with the media have resulted in wide news coverage and editorial on various child rights issues drawing the attention of the Govt and public alike.
- Since 2003 conducted more than 700 training programmes in various parts of the state and the country and have reached out to 21,000 personnel directly.
- Worked with 100 + teachers in 20 Schools (Shidlaghatta Taluk, Chikkaballapura Dist) while reaching out to 5000+ students in sensitizing on child rights and gender issues while sensitising and realising RTE Act 2009.
- In a collective effort facilitated in preventing 700+ Child marriages, provided information and knowledge about PCMA 2006 and rescued 1000 + children from labour situations while sensitising about CALPRA 1986.
- Trained 500 members of District Child Welfare Committees on Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act 2000/2015 and related statutes in protecting the interests of children.
- Facilitated in organizing 25 Rural Children's Libraries reaching out to more than 2500 children
- Initiated a Children's Museum with artefacts from across the world with more than 300 pieces which has been viewed and studied by more than 500 children.
- A daily news compilation and analysis of 'children in news' (CIN) is reaching out to 300 + clients comprising NGOs, Govt officials, media, students, activists, etc.
- E Manthana, an innovative method of conducting weekly webinars (initiated in April 2020) reached out to 3000 + participants.
- Advocated with the Education department to get a circular on display of ChildLine 1098 at schools premises and Health department in hospitals.
- Advocated with department of Labour to get circular to support ChildLine and NGOs in rescue and case interventions

5. Programme Highlights (2021-22)

- a. **Karnataka Child Rights Observatory (KCRO)** initiated in 2008 as a consortium of NGOs and interested individuals to monitor the situation of children in Karnataka from UNCRRC perspective. Today KCRO is also conducting various capacity building programmes both online and offline to equip the NGOs on child rights monitoring. KCRO works with groups of legislators from both Assembly and Council while raising child centric issues through the Karnataka State Legislators' Forum for Child Rights.



- Provided relief measures to around 10,000 urban poor and the migrating families, lactating and pregnant mothers and children, while working with UNICEF, Dept of Rural Development and Panchayat Raj, Bengaluru City Corporation during Covid Lockdown.
- Studied the effect of Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Yojana (PMGKY) and other social protection schemes in the state reaching out to the BPL families in all the 30 districts (conducted interviews in three phases in an interval of 15 days with the informers from villages)
- Tabulated and analysed the child centric questions raised in the Karnataka Legislative Assembly and Council and prepared the report 'Are there Children in Vidhana Soudha?'. Out of 12,780 questions raised in the Assembly (7,491) and Council (5,289), 608 questions are child centric [Assembly 342 and Council 266]
- Conducted a series of lectures and webinars on SDGs, NEP and Covid 19 care.



- b. RTE TaskForce Karnataka** was initiated in 2009 as a response to give wide publicity, education, training on the Right of the Children for Free and Compulsory Education Act 2009. Currently the RTE TaskForce is having a field operation at Sidlaghatta Taluk, Chikkaballpura district. The RTE TaskForce also takes the responsibility of sensitising the state network members on the various developments with respect to the RTE Act implementation both at national and state level.



- Conducted awareness sessions about Covid 19 and child marriage issues with 462 adolescents, 25 CMPOs, 126 Anganawadi workers and 50 ASHA workers.
- 45 child marriages prevented and followed up and 8 FIRs filed. One child marriage incident was followed up with the help of interstate coordination.
- Assessment of 50 Anganawadis conducted for status and services required and followed up with the local authorities. 23 AWCs got water connection under Jal Jeevan Mission, 2 AWC constructions initiated. With this learning CDPO's office-initiated assessment in 310 AWCs on the infrastructure requirements.
- Joined the *Oduva Belaku* initiative of RDPR and worked with 9 GP libraries in developing them to be child friendly; and contributed in discussions and efforts to improve the learning standards of children.
- 20 Rural Children's Libraries were equipped with reading and work books. 480 children have shown improvement in three language reading levels. In 36 villages 9 community volunteers could conduct activities with 671 children involving reading books, games and recreational activities
- Facilitated in admitting 45 children to Diploma courses, 23 to ITI and around 320 to join PUC.
- Workshops on Multi-Dimensional Learning Space Concept conducted with CRPs and BRPs in Sidlaghatta taluk.
- 28 GP level PDOs trained on the concept of Child Rights Grama Sabha. Collaborated with 10 GPs to conduct CRGS.
- In response to the issues raised in CRGS, 3 toilets, 3 new classrooms, 7 compounds, 4 old classrooms renovations and 2 new playgrounds were constructed under MNREGA.
- A PIL filed by RTE Task Force's network agency questioned rule 4(7) in the RTE Karnataka Rules. [the local authority shall identify the neighbourhood school where children can be admitted and make such information public for each habitation within its jurisdiction]
- Advocated for continued education to the children during Covid 19 lockdown in case of children enrolled to non govt schools under Sec. 12.1c of the RTE Act.
- Several complaints with respect to fee hike and pressure to pay fees to schools were handled; 21 cases could be settled at Bengaluru to either reduce the fees or waive off.



ChildLine 1098 Nodal Agency, Bengaluru coordinates with four ChildLine Collaborative agencies in Bengaluru since 2007. The Nodal agency conducts capacity building activities to the collaborative agency personnel and coordinates with the Govt and its other agencies in the smooth operation of ChildLine 1098 in linking the children in need of care protection with the service providers from Govt and other groups.



- Nodal agency coordinates with 4 ChildLine Collaborative agencies – APSA, BOSCO, SAATHI Railway and BOSCO Railway ChildLine
- Organised consultaitons with CDPOs and other stakeholders on effective case intervnetion in cases of child marriages, child labour and missing children. 85 participants from various departments.
- Organised workshops on understanding JJ Act and its interventions with the CWC, DD, DCPO, ACP and other stakeholders along with childLine Collaborative agencies,
- Organised ChildLine Se Dosti week in Nov reaching out to 500 community members.
- Took part in multi-level discussions with the communities, NGOs, SLSA, DCPU and in the High Court on the issues of rescuing children in begging and children used in begging. Took an active role in the campaign to end begging by providing material, posters and in the action plan development.
- Conducted 7 awareness programmes with children, adults including police personnel on JJ Act and POCSO.
- Responded to more than 50 calls for relief measures during Covid 19 lock down.
- Translated the 'Psychosocial Support for Children during COVID-19 Manual' into Kannada which is used for training the facilitators to provide psycho-social assistance to children affected by Covid 19.



d. Initiatives for Married Adolescent Girls Empowerment - IMAGE & IMAGE Next is largely working in five districts towards combating child marriages. CRT being a partner of a larger state level consortium since 2015 has taken the role of advocacy and knowledge partner of the project at the state level.



- In an innovative method loaded more than 150 tablets (supplied by TdH NL) with 10th standard and PUC syllabus (lessons drawn from Chandana and sourced from ILP-India Literacy Project) and reached them to EMGs- Early Married Girls located in remote villages in Chikballapur, Chamarajanagara, Bidar, Belagavi and Bagalakote to use the tools and face the exams in the Covid 19 period.
- As per the reports more than 500 girls were benefited by the material.
- Organised several competitions among EMGs to encourage them to communicate with the local community about Covid awareness and also prevent child marriages in the pandemic period.
- Conducted audio visual programs (online and recorded versions) on covid awareness, life skills and leadership development reaching more than 10000 EMGs and other community members.
- Conducted a public awareness programme at Bagepalli on 5th Aug 2020 involving the community members to prevent child marriages and particularly in the pandemic period.
- Organised a state level consultation with the SLSA, DLSA, DCPUs, ICPS, DWCD and KSCPCR with the EMGs and the field workers to draw the attention of the Govt on the plight of the EMGs and so as to prevent child marriages.
- Conducted a research on Status and Support required by the EMGs to integrate them into mainstream educational, development and participation on par with other children in the society and empower them in 5 districts of Karnataka with Ms. Nina Nayak being the chief consultant in the study. Study to be released in 2021.



e. **Children Getting Out of Devadasi (GOOD) System for further dedication**, concentrates on five north Karnataka districts to end the Devadasi System. CRT has been a consortium member since 2018 and is the knowledge partner along with making advocacy efforts.



- Organised series of programmes with the members of the consortium on Covid awareness and the public education to be conducted among the communities.
- Provided educational material to the members of the Kishori Sanghas to face 10th and PUC exams
- Conducted online life skills orientations
- Honoured Corona warriors from the groups who laboured to provide relief measures of the communities with a certificate.
- Organised a state level advocacy meeting with the Govt and concerned authorities like KLSA and KSCPCR to streamline the Prohibition of Devadasi dedication Act



f. **Children in Governance** is a new programme initiated in 2020 to facilitate Grama Panchayats (GPs) and the service providers at the GP level and the children in examining the role of child participation in Governance. The project has field presence in 60 GPs of 6 taluks in 3 districts. The project is coordinating with the Dept of Rural Development and Panchayat Raj and local NGOs and CBOs as well as other service providers and aims to organise the Child Rights Grama Sabhas effectively. The concept of CRGS was developed by CRT in 2006 in action research conducted in 15 GPs of Ballary district.



- The project has been just initiated and expected to get launched in the month of March in 15 GPs of Karnataka.

g. Child Rights Training, Rural children's library and Children's museum & network

activities are an ongoing programme of CRT since its beginning. CRT is the secretariat of CACL- Campaign Against Child Labour and Network for Parenting. CRT conducts training on child rights centric issues continuously with various partners all over with Govt., NGOs, educational institutions and private parties. As a part of the networking and advocacy, CRT invests a lot of time discussing with the media, social work, law and education colleges and students in taking the child rights information to every nook and corner.

CRT has a special interest in working with the Govt departments that have a greater attention towards children, that includes Dept of Women and Child Development; Directorate of Child Protection; Dept of Health; Dept of Education; Home; Rural Development and Panchayat Raj; Planning; Social Welfare; Labour and the State Legal Services Authority.

- In the UN year to eradicate child labour system in the world 2021 organised 44 days special campaign. Preparation for the same conducted with the member organisations in the state
- Took part in the national level planning meeting for the above.
- Conducted E Manthana online weekly programme on child rights related issues
- Continued support to Children's Museum but due to covid no significant activities possible.
- Rural children's libraries activities were limited to covid awareness

6. Prepared a paper on equity in ECCD, which identified the gaps and shortfalls across gender, caste, class and location and provided solutions and suggestions to improve the quality of the programme and reach.
